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Domestic Tourism Survey 2024

The Domestic Tourism Survey 2024 data are in two files. The files are flat, ASCII, fixed field files, with one line of given length per record. This format was chosen to make the data usable with as many statistical programs as possible, and thus accessible to as wide a range of people as possible.

Users can also access, explore and download the microdata in various formats, i.e. SAS, SPSS, Stata, etc. Users can access the metadata from Stats Online at www.statssa.gov.za.

Data files

The files and the corresponding sections of the questionnaire are as follows:

Daytrips:	Data from Cover and Sections 1 to 2
Overnight trips:	Data from Cover and Sections 3 to 5

The files also contain some derived variables.

The information in each file contains the following:

- Nature of records in the file and population covered.
- Description of variables

Description of variables

The description of the variables comprises the following information:

Descriptive name: This is a short English description plus the variable name in the original file used by Stats SA to construct the ASCII file.

Position of the variable: The position of the data within the record, recorded in the format (@xxx y.). '@xxx' indicates that the data begins at position (i.e. column) xxx and 'y' indicates that it is y digits wide. All data are numeric. All data are right justified.

Source: This is either the question in the questionnaire or, for derived variables, the method of derivation. Derived variables are usually found towards the end of a file.

Valid range: The range of valid values for the variable. For continuous variables, this reflects the upper and lower limits as found in the data.

Not applicable: The code for 'not applicable' is provided for each variable. These are now numeric.

Missing value: A code for 'missing/unspecified' values is given for each variable.

Notes: Specific observations to be noted by users.

Most questions in the Domestic Tourism Survey questionnaire are pre-coded, i.e. there is a set number of choices from which one or more must be selected. For open-ended 'write-in' questions, the description will state that post-coding occurred and explain how this was done. Most variables have been pre-coded from the questionnaire and are not repeated in the variable description. Where the coding is not apparent, the description either provides the codes or indicates where code lists are to be found.

Linking files

The data from different files can be linked based on a record identifier. The record identifier is the first field/s in each file. Each record contains a number (UqNo), which constitutes a unique household identifier. All records with a given unique household identifier, no matter which file they are in, belong to the same household. For individuals, a further two digits constitute the Person number (PersonNo). When these are added to the unique household identifier, a unique individual identifier is created. Again, these can be used to link records from the respective files.

Target population

The target population of the survey consists of all private households in all nine provinces of South Africa and residents in workers' hostels. The survey does not cover other collective living quarters such as students' hostels, old-age homes, hospitals, prisons and military barracks, and is therefore only representative of non-institutionalised and non-military persons or households in South Africa.

A. Sample design of the DTS 2024

The sample design for the DTS 2024 was based on a Master Sample (MS) that was originally designed for the QLFS. This Master Sample is shared by the Quarterly Labour Force Survey (QLFS), General Household Survey (GHS), Living Conditions Survey (LCS), Domestic Tourism Survey (DTS), Income and Expenditure Survey (IES), and Victims of Crime Survey (VOCS).

The Master Sample used a two-staged, stratified design with probability-proportional-to-size (PPS) sampling of PSUs from within strata, and systematic sampling of dwelling units (DUs) from the sampled primary sampling units (PSUs). A self-weighting design at provincial level was used. Stratification was done in two stages: Primary stratification was defined by metropolitan and non-metropolitan geographic area type. During secondary stratification, the Census 2001 data were summarised at PSU level. The following variables were used for secondary stratification: household size, education, occupancy status, gender, industry, and income.

Census enumeration areas (EAs) as delineated for Census 2001 formed the basis of the PSUs. The following additional rules were used:

- Where possible, PSU sizes were kept between 100 and 500 dwelling units (DUs).
- EAs with fewer than 25 DUs were excluded.
- EAs with between 26 and 99 DUs were pooled to form larger PSUs, and the criteria used was 'same settlement type'.

- Virtual splits were applied to large PSUs: 500 to 999 splits into two; 1 000 to 1 499 splits into three; and 1 500 plus split into four PSUs.
- Informal PSUs were segmented.

A randomised probability-proportional-to-size (RPPS) systematic sample of PSUs was drawn in each stratum, with the measure of size being the number of households in the PSU. Altogether, approximately 3 080 PSUs were selected. In each selected PSU, a systematic sample of this report deals with the data that were collected from January 2024 to March 2025. Given that a three-month recall period is used, the data of DTS 2025 January to March had to be included to fully construct the October, November, and December 2024 datasets. The DTS 2024 was based on the new Master Sample that was developed after Census 2011.

B. Sample design of the DTS 2025 Quarter 1

One of the objectives of the DTS is to obtain the estimates that indicate tourism's contribution toward the South African economy. However, this can be obtained by calculating estimates within the calendar year. Due to the rolling three-month recall period, there was a need to supplement the DTS 2024 data with the DTS 2025 Quarter 1 data. This first quarter of the DTS 2025 contains data from the trips undertaken in October, November and December 2024.

Allocating sample sizes to strata¹

The randomised PPS systematic sampling method is described below. This procedure was applied independently within each design stratum.

Let N be the total number of PSUs in the stratum, and the number of PSUs to be selected from the stratum is denoted by n . Also, let x_i denote the size measure of the PSU i within the stratum, where $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$. Then, the method for selecting the sample of n PSUs with the Randomised PPS systematic sampling method can be described as follows:

Step 1: Randomise the PSUs within the stratum.

The list of N PSUs within the stratum can be randomised by generating uniform random between 0 and 1, and then by sorting the N PSUs in ascending or descending order of these random numbers. Once the PSUs have been randomised, we can generate permanent sequence numbers for the PSUs.

Step 2: Define normalised measures of size for the PSUs.

We denote by x_i the measure of size (MOS) of PSU i within the design stratum. Then, the measure

of size for the stratum is given by $X = \sum_{i=1}^N x_i$. We define the normalised size measure P_i of PSU i as

$p_i = x_i / X$; $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$, where N is the total number of PSUs in the design stratum. Then,

p_i is the relative size of the PSU i in the stratum, and $\sum_{i=1}^N p_i = 1$ for all strata.

It should be noted that the value of $n \times p_i$, which is the selection probability of PSU i must be less than one.

Step 3: Obtain inverse sampling rates (ISRs)

Let R be the stratum inverse sampling rate (ISR). The stratum ISR is the same as the corresponding provincial ISR, because of the proportional allocation within the province.

It should also be noted that the proportional allocation within the province also results in a self-weighting design.

Then, the PSU inverse sampling rates (ISRs) are obtained as follows:

First, define N real numbers $Z_i = n \times p_i \times R$; $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$. It is easy to verify that

$\sum_{i=1}^N Z_i = n \times R$. Next, round the N real numbers Z_i ; $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$ to integer values R_i ; $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$ such that each R_i is as close as possible to the corresponding Z_i value and the R_i values add up to $n \times R$ within the stratum. In other words, the sum of the absolute differences between the R_i and the corresponding Z_i values is minimised subject to the constraint that the R_i values add up to $n \times R$ within the stratum. Drew, Choudhry and Gray (1978) provide a simple algorithm to obtain the integer R_i values as follows:

Let " d " be the difference between the value $n \times R$ and the sum $S = \sum_{i=1}^N [Z_i]$, where $[.]$ is the integer function, then R_i values can be obtained by rounding up the " d " Z_i values with the largest fraction parts, and by rounding down the remaining $(N - d)$ of them.

It should be noted that the integer sizes R_i ; $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$ are also the PSU inverse sampling rates (ISRs) for systematic sampling of dwelling units.

Step 4: Obtain cumulative ISR values

We denote by C_i ; $i = 1, 2, 3, \dots, N$ the cumulative ISRs of the PSUs within the stratum. It should be noted that the PSUs within the stratum have been sorted according to the sequence numbers that were assigned after the randomisation. Then, the cumulative ISRs are defined as follows:

$$C_1 = R_1,$$

$$C_j = C_{(j-1)} + R_j; \quad j = 2, 3, \dots, N.$$

It should be noted that the value C_N will be equal to $n \times R$, which is also the total number of systematic samples of dwelling units that can be selected from the stratum.

Step 5: Generate an integer random number r between 1 and R , and compute n integers r_1, r_2, \dots, r_n as follows:

$$r_1 = r$$

$$r_2 = r_1 + R$$

$$r_3 = r_2 + R$$

.

.

$$r_i = r_{(i-1)} + R$$

.

.

$$r_n = r_{(n-1)} + R.$$

Step 6: Select n PSUs out of the N PSUs in the stratum with the labels (sequence numbers) number i_1, i_2, \dots, i_n such that:

$$C_{i_1-1} < r_1 \leq C_{i_1}$$

$$C_{i_2-1} < r_2 \leq C_{i_2}$$

.

.

$$C_{i_n-1} < r_n \leq C_{i_n}.$$

Then, the n PSUs with the labels i_1, i_2, \dots, i_n would get selected with probabilities proportional to size, and the selection probability of the PSU i will be given by $\frac{R_i}{R}$.

Weighting

DTS 2024 was collected continuously, based on a rolling three-month recall period. This meant that to reconstruct travel for the period January to December 2024, the data from the DTS 2024 and the DTS 2025 January to March collection were used to create the final data set. Thus, 14 survey months from February 2024 to March 2025 were used to create the 12 monthly data files for the calendar year 2024. The sampling weights were then constructed for the 12 reference months. These included both full sample and replicate weights for each of the 12 reference months. The full sample and replicate weights were calibrated using the population control totals for the cells defined by the cross-classification Age-Group x Population-Group x Gender at the national level, and broad Age-Groups at the province level. These are the same population control totals that are used for constructing the calibrated weights for the Quarterly Labour Force Survey and the other household surveys. The weighted monthly data files can be combined to produce annual and bi-annual estimates with the WESVAR software.

Sampling and the interpretation of the data

Caution must be exercised when interpreting the results of the DTS at low levels of disaggregation. Revisions to the DTS data sets based on the new population estimates involved benchmarking at national level in terms of age, sex and population group while at provincial level, benchmarking was by population group only. The sample and reporting are based on the provincial boundaries as defined in December 2005. The DTS 2024 data was collected from January to December 2024 and therefore takes seasonality into consideration. Its unique weighting method also results in the data not being comparable with the data collected during the previous years.

Coverage

The target population is private households in all nine provinces of South Africa, and residents in workers' hostels. The survey does not cover other collective living quarters such as students' hostels, old age homes, hospitals, prisons and military barracks.

Definitions of terms

A **trip** is a journey taken outside the usual environment of the household.

Day trip is a trip during which the respondent or members of the household went for the trip and returned on the same day.

Overnight trip is a trip on which the respondent spent one or more nights away from his or her usual environment.

Package trip is a trip in which two or more items are included in the price (e.g. accommodation and transport).

Tourism includes all trips away from one's usual environment, not just holiday/leisure trips. It also includes trips related to business, visiting friends and/or relatives, medical/health, and religious journeys, amongst others.

The **usual environment** is defined as all places within a 40-kilometre radius of the place of usual residence of the respondent, and all places that the respondent visits at least once a week (e.g. going to work), irrespective of the distance from their usual residence.

Period of reference refers to the three months prior to the survey period. For example, for the survey period January 2025, the period of reference would be trips undertaken in October 2024, November 2024 and December 2024.
